


Membership


- Three Fires Council serves 14,791 families in 2017. This marks three consecutive years of membership growth.
- 6011 volunteers played a significant role in designing and delivering the Scouting program across the council.
- The Council successfully coordinated the multi-Council "Blast into Scouting" membership drive resulting in 1,507 new Cub Scout and families joining Scouting programs.
- Nationally, the council ranked in the top quartile for overall Fall recruitment growth in 2017.
- The quality of the Scouting program in the Three Fires Council made a positive impact in the communities across the Council territory. As a result of quality, energized, exciting, and family-oriented programs, the council.
- Our co-educational Exploring program continues to grow. More than 400 high school vouth experienced this career-based programs.



Administration/Governance

- Through the technology committee a new website was launched.
- Conducted a two-day Executive Board retreat.
- · Achieved the National SILVER status for the Journey to Excellence program recognizing the Council level of achievements in Membership, Finance, Program and Unit Service.
- Through the Council's nominating committee recruited 3 new members to the Executive
- Completed a Business Practice Assessment to review council operations and indentify areas of needed improvement. Recognized as one of top 3% of councils related to operations.
- Scout Executive Joe Wiltrout received a promotion to Crossroads of America Council in Indianapolis, IN. The Council Selection Committee selected Clint Scharff to be the 4th Scout Executive for the Three Fires Council.

Camping:

- Introduced a new Day Camp Model that was open to the whole family, allowed early drop-off and late pick-up, and more consistent program to respond to parent's needs.
- Day Camp attendance was 1,356 which was an 8% increase and stopped a four-year decline.
- New Activities at our Day Camps included STEM activities, a 75-foot-long inflatable obstacle course, and a human foosball court.
- 2,886 or 62.7% of Boy Scouts participated in a summer camp experience.
- 171 Boy Scouts and Venturers attended the National Jamboree at the Summit Bechtel Reserve.
- Awarded \$10,417 in campership assistance funding to 96 Scouts.
- All camps rated "Accredited


Activities & Civic Service:

 142,143 hours of community services were reported by units throughout the Three Fires Council for an average of 9.61 hours of reported service by youth and adult members totaling 14,786 participants.

Training:

- 547 youth and adults attended Training Academy
- National Youth Leadership Training (NYLT) had 80 youth participants.
- 91.4% of all adults are trained in Youth Protection





Advancement & Recognition:

- 385 Eagle Scouts awarded
- 6,368 Cub Scout advancements earned.
- 2,260 Boy Scouts advancements earned.
- Merit Badge University had over 1,536 Scouts enrolled from 12 Councils within 5 mid-west states, teaching 90 different Merit Badge classes.
- 12,926 merit badges earned (top five badges were first aid, finger printing, swimming, environmental science, and personal fitness).
- Lowaneu Allanque Lodge achieved the National Silver Status for Journey to Excellence Program recognizing the Lodge's achievements in Program and Service.

Physical Resources:

- Developed designs and construction drawings for expansion and renovation of the Kiwanis Lodge and a new Maintenance Compound at Camp Big Timber.
- New Kiwanis Lodge will add a 200-seat capacity dining hall, deck and gathering area, and 8 stand-alone shower rooms to an existing lodge that will be completely renovated with a new kitchen, bathroom, dry and cold storage, and Hearth Room.
- The new Maintenance Compound will include an 8,500-sq. ft. maintenance and storage building with program capacity and a 4,800-sq. ft. open-sided garage for additional storage.
- Purchased a new 60" zero-turn grasshopper lawnmower and large grill for Camp Freeland Leslie.
- Renovated the firebowl at Camp Big Timber with all new benches, stone walk ways, painted back drop, and new road and performance area.



Finance & Development • The Three Fires Council continued to be a lea

- The Three Fires Council continued to be a leader in the area of Friends of Scouting growth and is consistently ranked among the top Central Region councils by raising \$639,294 through community and family giving.
- Total Support and Revenue for 2017 was \$3,898,401, a 2% increase over 2016.
- Conducted a successful 2017 Friends of Scouting Patron's Breakfast in November raising \$129,859.
- Successfully completed 6 special events in 2017.
- The net revenue from our special events increased by 58%.
- The Council popcorn sale raised \$2,473,608 in gross sales. This makes the Three Fires Council sale the highest of all like sized Councils.
- Over \$1,852,118 went back to Scouting in the Three Fires Council.
- \$95,441 worth of incentive and recognition prizes were distributed to participating Scouts and units for their efforts in the Council popcorn sale.
- More than \$157,000 sold online popcorn sales through Trails-End.com. A \$37,000 increase over the 2016 online sale.

- Increase endowment by \$18,862.
