Dear Scouting Friends,

Three Fires Council, Boy Scouts of America is privileged to serve our communities through Scouting. 2019 saw the launch of Scouts BSA (formerly Boy Scouts) and as a result we welcomed 171 girls, in 16 new girl-only troops. Our Scouts BSA troops recognized 299 Scouts with the rank of Eagle Scout. At the same time, the number of Cub Scout packs serving the whole family nearly doubled.

We completed construction and renovation of The Lodge at Camp Big Timber in Elgin. An incredible resource which will enable great programs for generations to come. We encourage families to explore the property, sleep under the stars and make lasting memories.

We launched a new district structure to better position Council services to unit leaders. While the transition hasn't been without hiccups we believe that moving from ten districts to three and staffing each district with multiple staff and combining various committees will allow us to leverage resources, technology and volunteer time to better serve units and members.

This past year, more than 1,400 Scouts attended Merit Badge University, the largest merit badge single day program in the country. Camp Big Timber had more campers than ever before. 1,060 Cub Scouts participated in our local day camps throughout the community and more than 900 youth attended the premier patrol method Scouts BSA summer camp at Camp Freeland Leslie in Oxford, WI. This patrol method camp gives Scouts the opportunity to axe throw, learn archery, boating, Scoutcraft, lifesaving, log rolling and much more, all while being surrounded by their friends, troop leaders and the beautiful Wisconsin wilderness and night sky. All this and more because of your gifts of time, talent and treasure – we thank you.

We hope that you continue the adventure with us at Three Fires Council for years to come.

Council Reflects on Opening its Doors to Both Boys and Girls

More than 2,000 boys and girls from across DeKalb, DuPage, Kane, Kendall and portions of Cook and Will counties joined Cub Scout packs in 2019, a program renowned for character building, fun and adventure.

Families signed-up their sons and daughters for Cub Scouts. Cub Scout dens (boys or girls the same age) are single gender. Cub Scout packs (made of multiple dens) include a combination of all-boy and all-girl dens. This unique approach allows the organization to maintain the integrity of the single-gender model while also meeting the needs of today's families.

Boy Scouts of America made a historic decision in February 2019 and opened the Boy Scout program, now called Scouts BSA, to both boys and girls ages 11-17.

Madeline Obora, a sister to an Eagle Scout and with a twin brother in a local Naperville troop, is very enthusiastic. "Even though I am super busy between sports and school, I am really excited to be a part of Scouts BSA. I've watched my brothers have a lot of fun going up the ranks, doing a bunch of different activities, and making great friends that they stay connected with. I can't wait to catch up to my twin brother!"

Since the launch of Scouts BSA, more than 170 girls (in 16 troops) registered for Scouts BSA within DuPage, Dekalb, Kane and Kendall counties. Each Scouts BSA troop is single-gender and meets independently.

Boys and girls continue to be involved in Venturing and Exploring. 





Our new Lodge opened its doors at Camp Big Timber in Elgin, IL. The Lodge was fully renovated in 2019, in order to meet the future needs of Scouting. With a full-size commercial kitchen, the Lodge dining hall entertains groups of up to 160. It opens up to the panoramic deck, overlooking the fire pit and is connected to the three-season porch and multipurpose meeting room.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony was held in June dedicating various rooms in honor of Scouters who have made a

significant difference in the lives of youth. Dedications of the Lodge included: Tom O'Malley Memorial Kitchen, Founders Rooms named after Daniel J. and Judith Zedan and the Veranda dedicated to the Lundsteen Legacy of Leadership.

In October, we welcomed several community members for our Distinguished Citizens Award Gala, where the Lodge was fully decked out and 'glamped' up! It was a night of fun, good food,



great music, silent auction and celebration honoring our distinguished citizen, Ian Lamp from Lamp Incorporated.

The beautiful Lodge at Camp Big Timber will continue to serve the Scouting community for years to come, from unit gatherings to day camp and family hikes. Camp Big Timber is also a great location to host a wedding, family reunion, fundraiser, birthday party or business meeting at this rustic, but modern, facility.
